#### 11) Creating an Urban River – can it really hold platypus again?

**By Chris Daniels** 

Professor Christopher Daniels is chair of the Green Adelaide Landscape Board, and member of 30 other Environmental Boards and committees, and he's leading many efforts to 'rewild' the city and connect citizens with nature.

The Torrens is Adelaide's most iconic river. Destroyed in the 19th Century and restructured in the 20th, does the Torrens deliver enough quality environment to enhance Adelaide and perhaps ultimately support Platypuses? Green Adelaide is proposing to reintroduce platypuses into the River Torrens after an absence of more than a hundred years. Prof Daniels will discuss the problems to be addressed and a timeline for their reintroduction.

Tom Gordon is Professor and Head of the Department of Immunology at Flinders University and the Flinders Medical Centre. He is a clinical immunologist, rheumatologist and immunopathologist with an interest in systemic autoimmune diseases, particularly lupus and Sjögren's syndrome. In today's talk he will explain how a rogue antibody was discovered that had caused the very rare bleeding and clotting complications in 2021 following COVID19 vaccinations. This discovery had a major global impact around the world and led to the cancellation of adenoviral-based vaccines in Australia, Europe and the USA.
